The Matariki stars are the foundation on which we chose to build our Te kahui tuao (Constellation of Volunteers) because this Maori worldview aligns with our areas of work, our passions, and because light is a metaphor for leader and putting others first.

Table 1: Shows the nuggets of wisdom harvested for each Matariki star/environmental area. Participants worked in small groups and talked about key insights from their work in these areas, and explore the question "Why is this work important to you?" Post-it's were then delivered to the illustrators to create our Constellation of Volunteers in visual form.
